A message from board member - Emma Johnson

I've been reflecting on how to translate the transformative experience of my many trips to Liberia in a way that invites others along for the journey. I'm starting to think it is, in fact, not possible to truly capture and convey the texture of what it feels like when the gravity of a certain experience falls into place.

There is no elegant way to say that breaking the poverty cycle is tremendously hard and takes a long time.

Data is helpful, yes, but numbers do not capture what it feels like to see someone you know get their footing, open a business, and pay for their children's school fees. Numbers don't capture what it feels like to care about someone who cannot afford their kids' school fees or the critical medical attention they need.

I think if you could experience this, if you could experience the intensity and relentlessness of this country, the heat, the sweat, the friendships, the resilience of every damn person having lived through civil wars, the Ebola crisis, corrupt government leadership, and just... life in a country that is unforgiving.

If you could watch, over years, as the people you care about go from merely surviving (and sometimes not), to building truly prosperous lives for themselves, their families, and their communities. If you could see how a seemingly small leg up has the potential to drastically alter the course of someone's life, you wouldn't be able to stop thinking about it either.

There's that story about how, when you adjust the heading of an airplane by 2 degrees, it drastically alters the end destination. By cities. Even countries. This is my ode to the 2 degrees — a testimonial for how true that story is in the context of Liberia and the work we do there. This is my way of imploring you to pay attention to the seemingly small 2 degree work happening in this world, because it truly is life changing for everyone we reach.

Beekeeping

Beekeeping supports environmental conservation efforts while offering a viable income source to farmers throughout Liberia. When asked what three things beekeepers put their earnings towards, the top responses were:

- 1. Children's school fees
- 2. Home construction
- 3. Beehive construction

A guaranteed income source in Liberia is hard to come by, Beekeeping offers people this and the means to take a step towards the life they envision.



"When you live a financially insecure life, it's risky to put your energy into something you aren't sure about. Initially people felt uncertain about beekeeping and so they grew their hives slowly. Now beekeeping has proven itself as a money making activity and the number of hives a farmer invests in initially is on the rise. Starting with 50 hives is becoming more common instead of 2"

- Continued work with 75% of Liberia's conservation partners including Wild Chimpanzee Foundation, Partners in Development, Solimar, Society for Conservation of Nature in Liberia, Chimpanzee Rescue and Protection, and Forest Development Authority. Together we are working to create 871,472 hectares of National Parks to support preservation of biodiversity.
- 411 new beekeepers trained
- 645 beekeepers supported through our extension program
- Equipment distribution:
 - 82 bee suits
 - 82 buckets
 - 41 smokers
 - 41 honey extractors
 - 630 hives

Coconut oil

In our ongoing efforts to advance Liberia's coconut oil industry, our team has dedicated the year to collaborating with farmers on planting coconut groves, training communities in oil production, and facilitating connections between suppliers and businesses for product purchases. Notably, we have achieved significant milestones this year: **doubling the amount of coconut oil sold by farmers, enabling Liberia Pure to achieve \$118,483 in sales** of coconut oil products since its inception, and establishing a **new solar-powered coconut oil factory** at Pillar of Fire Mission.

The coconut oil industry stands to offer a promising economic opportunity for farmers, producers, and small business owners at each stage of the value chain.

Strive's Business Development program conducted two successful cohorts in 2023, reporting the following outcomes:

- Average Profit increase: 24%
- Average salary increase: 36%
- Business ledger use increase: 280%
- Budget use increase: 160%
- Inventory control use increase: 82%
- Formal bank account use increase: 35%

With increasing acknowledgment from the global surf community, local youth now have an alternative to the fishing industry, which. despite its profitability, is recognized for its volatility and associated risks.
